PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As we approach the end of a second, and hopefully last, COVID affected year, I marvel at our community's capacity to ensure excellent learning continued, in spite of the hurdles the pandemic has thrown up. This report is a tribute to that work.

As I have mentioned many times, the effective education of young people is the outcome of a collaborative process. When teachers, students and families work towards a shared goal, great things happen. The various impediments to teaching and learning that the COVID pandemic has wrought upon us has made effective collaboration doubly important. It has, therefore, been exceptionally pleasing to see families and students work together so well with teachers, and the school more generally, to achieve very good outcomes over the past two years.

I have written this previously; there is a strong and not unrealistic case to suggest that we can hope the impacts of COVID on learning have been mild, and the impacts on the mental health and wellbeing of young people, will be transitory.

Whilst acknowledging that some individual students have suffered losses in their learning, significant cohort level data strongly suggests that the impacts of remote learning on academic growth has, so far, been minimal. The evidence for this is that in 17 of the 26 VCE studies our students took up last year, the percentage of our students achieving study scores of 37 or higher was equal to or above "similar" schools. Not only that, in terms the percentage of students achieving an ATAR of 80 or higher, it was our best result in about a decade. Furthermore, our NAPLAN data this year was very strong, with our top two band percentages being higher than "similar" schools in four of five domains, and just a single point lower in the fifth.

This report though, is not about celebrating these figures but of what it took to achieve them. It was through the adaptability, hard work and commitment of our teachers to re-cast their practice completely, and to connect with students in different ways. It was through the perseverance and grit of our students to keep pushing themselves when school and home-time became virtually indistinguishable, and one day would blur into the next. It was through parents taking an active and supportive role in assisting their children's learning directly, or by liaising with their children's teachers, to find what would work best to ensure learning continued.

Amongst the College Values are Teamwork, Empathy and Excellence. The actions I mentioned above were our College values being lived. The collective effort of staff, students and parents was teamwork at its finest. The window into the homes and lives of students, staff and parents, which Teams provided, developed an empathy between them unlike any we have previously seen. The focus on personal growth, of making as much progress as possible given the conditions, exactly reflected the College's idea of excellence. I want to thank everyone for living our Values and allowing students to experience success because of it.

We should all join together in thanking our teaching staff. There are few things worse than thinking you have finished an arduous journey, and yet in rounding the final bend, seeing a final long and treacherous climb unfolding before you. This is what the sudden and prolonged return to remote learning was like for teachers (and of course for students and parents). The capacity and willingness of our teachers to take a deep breath and set themselves to pick up the additional burdens which remote teaching imposes was admirable, professional and courageous.

Our Education Support Staff continued to keep the wheels turning. Buildings still needed to be maintained, accounts paid, payrolls managed, and IT systems kept functioning. Like everyone else in our community, they

had to adapt to new ways of working and managing the challenges of being locked down, and they came through with flying colours. Thank you.

To the Principal Team, Lee Angelidis, Kaye Sentry and Pat Gargano, and the rest of the Leadership Team, Leisa Higgins, Janine Mowat, Rebecca McMahon, Jen McBride, Emma Holmes, Nathan Hutchins and Melissa Antoniuk, your work, commitment to the school, guidance, and support have been outstanding. On behalf of the school community, thank-you.

I want to thank our parents/guardians for their support. Once again, you have been by our side in this all the way. You have supported the school in our efforts and recognised that none of us could do this alone.

The College Council, lead by Asaf Harel, has been steadfast in its support of the school, and in discharging its important governance and strategic planning roles. Once again, they have not let the COVID situation knock them off course. I also want to thank Kate Wengier and the rest of the PFA for their support. Their hard work supports the school in many tangible and important ways, and this, in turn, supports us to achieve better outcomes for our students.

Our College Captains have been outstanding this year. I met with Isabel Overhill, Kiyara Perera, and Bethany Pham on a weekly basis, and they never lost their drive, passion and enthusiasm for the school. They kept coming up with ideas to improve the school, and give their fellow students great experiences, even when various COVID restrictions kept thwarting their plans. Thank you for your humour, positivity, drive and care for your fellow students and the school.

To our students, you have, with few exceptions, adapted and stuck to your work admirably. The social content of school is such an important, and enjoyable, component of a person's school years, and this has been largely denied to you. Nevertheless, you have persisted in your work, and arguably, learnt different things, things about yourself, that perhaps, in a normal school year you may not. Thank you for your persistence, courage, creativity and determination.

Finally, to our year 12 students. It is not an overstatement to say you will be a graduating cohort like no other in the history of Brighton Secondary College. Two years of COVID-interrupted learning will have tempered you in a way that few students have been previously at Brighton. The resilience and adaptability you have had to learn and display will, undoubtably, be of benefit to you no matter what you do in future years.

Please don't spend too much time thinking about what you missed out on in the past two years. People are not moulded by their experiences, but by the decisions they took to seek those experiences, or in response to them. You may have felt, at times, powerless in the face of COVID, but you all took decisions and made choices every day in how you responded to it. It is the quality of your decision-making which is, ultimately, what schools are trying to improve so that you are ready for life beyond our gates. Go into the future confident you are ready for the world. Work hard, be kind, and keep learning.

PRINIPAL'S AGQUISITION



Sydney chose to explore the natural landscape and like the Impressionists before her focused on the effects of light and the impact it has on the way we view our surroundings. Her final piece (a section of which is captured here) is a collection of 130 acrylic paintings on wooden blocks of various thicknesses, each a depiction of a particular part of the greater landscape of RSEA park. Addressing the conceptual possibility of "interaction" in her exploration proposal, these little 12cm x 9cm landscapes produce a journey of the park from left to right across two larger wooden boards, as she leaves her house and returns to it. She hoped to "capture the indefinite means in which the purity of the natural elements impacts the environment", whilst providing a representation of the significance that this park has in her life. Due to this, she used wood with thicknesses ranging from 3mm to 20mm, in which landscapes that held a greater significance were painted on thicker pieces, and those with less, on thinner pieces. This not only provided atheistic qualities of physical contrast within the final composition, but also gives the viewer a deeper understanding of the subjectiveness to which our appreciation for landscape can hold, coupled with an added layer of complexity in the form of depth.

SUB-SCHOOLS' REPORT

2021 had begun with the promise of 'normal'. Having overcome the novel challenges of 2020, our students immediately immersed themselves in school life. Despite the overhanging concerns of the previous year the swimming carnival was well attended and the year 7 and 12 camps were successfully run early term 1. Unexpectedly, our learning community was again thrust into the familiar environment of remote learning for short bursts throughout first semester. Our students and staff were able to quickly adapt to the well known demands of on-line learning, before efficiently reverting back to onsite, once subsequent lockdowns were lifted. It was slowly becoming apparent that the shadow of 2020 was looming large over 2021.

It would be easy to focus on the challenges wrought by the delta variant on school closures and the impact of extended remote learning. There is no doubt that the extended lockdown in third term tested our collective resilience. However, to dismiss and ignore the possible learnings from such an experience can be short sighted and to our detriment. The concept of on-line learning is not new. Many remote communities have relied (and still do) on such a mode of learning with which to educate their children. We cannot deny the considerable challenges that have come with school led remote learning, however, it would be remiss to not acknowledge the positives.



Our children have had to:

- gradually become more independent learners and appropriately self-manage. They have to, at times, dig deep and demonstrate perseverance as they battled against the monotony of being seated in a single room, day after day in front of a screen. They have had to find resilience as a learner and continue to strive for personal best despite the challenges of fluctuating self-motivation. They have had to slowly come to the understanding that life is not, nor will be, at all times easy.
- learn to appreciate the little things such as authentic online connections through innovative lessons (who would have thought that creating a smoothie was a lesson as part of the Food Security unit in year 9 Humanities); enjoying genuine time as a family and rediscovering the wonders of a good old fashioned board game, or being consciously present in the moment and seeing the season of Spring slowly unfurl before their eyes as a variety of coloured blossoms began to fill front yards and nature strips

Many of us have yet to come to terms with the fact that we are in the midst of a pandemic and that life as we know it has forever changed. Most importantly, we see that our young people have the capacity to acknowledge and embrace the challenge, adapt and grow. Education and learning can not, and is not, just about the content alone, but also about the acquisition of skills and a broader understanding of the world beyond the four walls – whether that be of a classroom or bedroom.

We have seen how in 2021, our students, parents and staff acknowledged the challenges, persevered and with sheer grit pulled together as a community, to get through. We set the foundation for the future, by preparing the capable people who will be defining it.

Pare you well Pat Gargano. Our long serving Assistant Principal of 19 years is calling time on his brilliant career of service to young people in Victoria.

Pat started teaching in Technical schools in the late 1970's and could regale his colleagues, and sometimes students, with stories about what schooling was like in those days. It is a testament to the massive changes that have occurred in schools over the decades of his career that he still had his strap from those days, but now, instead of being a feared device for causing pain, it was merely a bizarre and strange curio.

Pat's work ethic, capacity to solve complex problems, and integrity are legendary, as was his sartorial style and class.

Emails with various solutions, suggestions or contributions to the most thorny of problems would arrive at all hours of the day or night. As the manager of College Operations, when presented with sudden and complex problems, he would inevitable say in a calm voice, "I'll have a look at it." Almost inevitably, 6 or 12 hours later, he'd come back with an elegant solution which met the needs of everyone concerned. He always downplayed the amount of work he did. Another of his pet phrases was, "I've done the hack work on this." When you heard that, you knew there had been many hours spent grappling with spreadsheets to make things easier for others.

The nature of Pat's role also meant that his decisions often has direct impact on the working lives of teachers. The integrity he went about his work was faultless. If Pat had told a staff member he would try and work out a problem for them, they knew, as a man of his word, he would do everything he could to do so. It's an old turn of phrase, but Pat's word was his bond.

Pat never lost his love for educating young people. For many years It was my privilege to spend most lunchtimes patrolling the yard with him. Apart from talking about his beloved Bombers, he would go out of his way to chat with the young people we met out there. He would interact with them in the ways that only people who adore teaching young people can. I have seen him teach children everything from tying a double Windsor knot, to calculating the height of the light towers of the hockey field in these moments.

All of this came with a man of style (no one can wear a suit and tie quite like Pat) sense of humour, class (I have never heard him swear in my 17 years working with him) and elite coffee making skills - he is amazing and will be sorely missed.

On behalf of the College Community, including all your colleagues, past and present, I wish you a long, happy, and healthy retirement which you can enjoy with Dee and your grandchildren.

WELLBEING TEAM

t's easy, in the midst of the significant challenges of the past few months, to forget that we had a relatively "normal" start to the 2021 year. It was delightful to welcome the new Year 7 students into the school community, enabling a smooth transition with the support of our Year 10 Peer Support leaders, some of whom attended the Year 7 camp at Anglesea. We were able to begin PEP classes - which include emotional and social literacy education from the Department of Education's Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships program. The Year 7 START program was able to function relatively smoothly, in spite of a few reschedules as lockdowns began to intrude on our time at school. And we were able to successfully implement the Youth Resilience Survey, giving us an important snapshot of the wellbeing and connectedness of our school community.

Much of this, of course, seems like a distant memory as we were again plunged into the challenges of extended lockdowns. The task for the wellbeing team pivoted to providing remote support for students, both collectively and individually. We worked closely with Tilly Morse, the student wellbeing leader, and her committee of senior students. They partnered with organisations such as Connect Health and Headspace, producing a "time capsule" video that featured in an assembly at the end of Term 3 and some wellbeing packs that were distributed to Year 12 students when they returned for the GAT. We also used the services of Connect Education to provide some online wellbeing education to Year 10 girls, who had been identified through the Youth Resilience Survey as needing some additional mental health support.

We continue to be very fortunate to have the services of a very professional, experienced and qualified wellbeing team that includes a student welfare coordinator, two psychologists, a social worker and a chaplain. Each member of the team makes a unique and important contribution to the emotional strength of our students, enabling them to more effectively achieve their academic potential. We wish our chaplain, Jess, health and happiness as she takes maternity leave from November. Tania, one of our mental health practitioners, will add some additional days to her load to cover Jess's

The chaplaincy position at Brighton Secondary has a long history of many decades of faithful service to the college community. This position has been supported over that time by a chaplaincy committee members of the local community who work to support the chaplain and, at times, raise funds to enable the continuation of this role. I want to acknowledge BICCY's Op Shop in Brighton, for their generosity towards our school community through providing funds to support chaplaincy. This year also marks the retirement of two of our longest serving chaplaincy committee members -Jocelyn Hanby and Merridie Costello. Whilst these names will not necessarily be familiar to most in the college community, Jocelyn and Merridie have made significant contributions to the wellbeing of thousands of students through their decades of support for chaplaincy at Brighton.

The whole school community, including the wellbeing team, is faced with the many challenges of supporting our students as they return to school following two years of extended lockdowns. We will need to find ways to build strength and resilience in our young people as they manage any deficits in their education, mental health and socialisation arising from these experiences. As always, the best outcomes will be achieved if we work together, supporting each other to ensure that our common goal - the healthy development of the young people in our care - is achieved.

MATHEMATICS

t has been another exciting year in Mathematics at Brighton Secondary College!

Congratulations to all students, parents, carers and community members for your contributions, engagement and enthusiasm. The Mathematics teaching team recognise that 2021 was another very challenging year, and we are all very proud of student efforts during onsite and remote learning.

Year 7-10 students completed a structured work program that gave them opportunity to develop their mathematical fluency, problem solving and reasoning skills. In addition to the core curriculum coursework, students had the opportunity to undertake hands on and creative activities. Examples include:

- Year 7 ELHES Mathematics students used their creative writing skills to write stories that demonstrated their knowledge and understanding of statistics.
- Year 7 ELHES Mathematics students used their knowledge of measurement, fractions, and decimals, to bake cakes that represented mathematical concepts.
- Year 8 STEM Mathematics students used their understanding of statistics to advise State Premiers on future Government Policy for Covid lockdowns.
- Year 9 Mathematics students applied their knowledge of area and perimeter to create their own tiny living space and used scaling and architectural symbols to draft a floor plan.
- Year 9 I&E Mathematics students ventured outside to measure tall objects. They used an app to measure angles of elevation and then used their knowledge of trigonometry to calculate the height of the object.
- Year 9 I&E Mathematics students used their knowledge of ratios and similarity to produce scaled drawings.

- Year 10 Foundation Mathematics students studied ratios in the context of making chocolate 'rum' balls. On top of figuring out the required amounts of each ingredient, students needed to calculate the most economical way to purchase their ingredients.
- Year 10 Enrichment Mathematics students used their knowledge of algebra and graphs to construct models of rollercoaster rides.

Year 11-12 students should feel exceptionally proud of the effort and perseverance they demonstrated in some of the most difficult years to undertake such challenging subjects. Transitioning between remote learning and in-person learning has provided new and challenging difficulties to the mathematics classroom, and the flexibility students have shown is truly inspiring.

In term two, we were lucky enough to have Acting Sergeant Joe Ianzano from the Moorabbin police station visit for an interactive Q&A session to talk to the Year 10 students about their rights, police work, common youth crimes and the consequences. This visit supported the Year 10 Civics and Citizenship unit of study on Youth and the Law.

While Geography fieldwork excursions were cancelled due to COVID restrictions, our teachers and students adapted remarkably to get the BSC students interacting with their environment. The Year 9 groups enjoyed breakfast together online while mapping the origins of each ingredient they used, calculated how far it took each ingredient to travel to their home, and reflected on their breakfast in terms of food availability and accessibility as an Australian. Our Year 7 I&E and ELHES students also ventured into the community assessing the liveability of their own neighbourhoods.

Our Year 8 I&E Business students kept busy using their innovative and creative minds to participate in a Plan Your Own Enterprise competition in their Economics studies and a Homelessness Challenge through the Victorian Challenge and Enrichment Series with The Big issue and the Salvation Army. In both activities students developed and presented a creative ideas to their classmates and external providers.



Finally, the Year 9 l&E students were lucky enough to gain a scholarship to compete in the School Entrepreneur of the Year program with Generation Entrepreneur. They completed a full day workshop with industry professionals, who guided them through the process of developing innovative solutions to problems and the processes used to transform ideas into reality. They then made their own pitch to a panel of external judges. It was a brilliant opportunity for some real-world exposure to the world of business, innovation and enterprise!
