# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Whilst we can look back at 2022 and think of it as a post-lockdown year, it has by no means been a post COVID one. From many perspectives, one could argue that 2022 was a more challenging year, because of the effects of COVID, than those preceding it.

Although the previous two years saw students physically separated from school, they had continuous access to their teachers, albeit virtually at times. The end of lockdowns in 2022 saw a much higher prevalence of COVID in the community, and this caused a very high rate of rolling absences of both staff and students. This resulted in significant impacts on learning continuity as staff and students were frequently absent for week-long blocks because of the isolation requirements on infected persons, or from being a close contact of a known COVID case.

The COVID situation was overlaid on to what is already one of the most complex and challenging environments, that is, schools.

As Dr Briony Scott pointed out in her recent keynote address to the National Excellence in School Leadership Institute, schools are composed of individuals (teachers and ES staff) meeting the needs of another large group of individuals (students) who are intimately connected with a third large group of individuals (parents, step parents and carers). Each of these individuals sit in their own place somewhere on a continua for each of a wide variety of attributes which make all of them think, behave, and interact with others in a unique way.

These continua might describe the extent to which a person is shy or outgoing, confident or nervous, thoughtful or instinctive, risk taking or risk averse, introverted or extroverted, interested or indifferent, sick or well, able or have additional needs, literate, or numerate. Now, ask one group of individuals (teachers) to take the other group of individuals (students) through a standardized curriculum at roughly the same pace, whilst the messy, unpredictable vicissitudes of life play out around them all.

The work the people in schools do is astonishing in its complexity and challenge, and I think it is high time this is acknowledged and appreciated.

So, I want to note that this year, as with the previous two, has been extremely challenging even by the usual standards of schools, and to thank all members of our community for their stoicism, and perseverance, in getting through it.

It was pleasing to see the return of the majority of our major extra and co-curricular activities this year. Our camps program resumed, with students in years 7, 8, 9 and 12 returning to Anglesea, Beaufort, Trafalgar and Phillip Island, respectively. These events provide very important opportunities for personal growth, and we are very glad they are back.

It was my privilege to witness first-hand a number of our other extra-curricular events this year. I had the pleasure of watching our senior girls' soccer team win the State Championship, our debating team defeat a local independent school, a wonderful evening of music at our annual Chorals festival, and be wonderfully entertained by our student-written dramatic production, "Wonderland."

These events are but a sample of the many opportunities that the College presents to our students (in addition to an excellent academic education) and I thank all those students who got involved, and urge them, and others who may not have yet done so, to be involved again next year.

I want to warmly and sincerely thank the many dedicated staff who supported our extra and co-curricular programs this

year. They volunteered their time to support our students to participate in an amazing array of wonderful activities. The reality is that for many students, it is not learning algebra or language structures, but the memories associated with their participation in these events which will stand the test of time.

Furthermore, it is the dispositions and attitudes developed by participating in these events that, arguably, are those that will set them up for success for life after school. Teamwork, collaboration, trial and error, reflection and refinement, effort, and perseverance are all dispositions and skills required in these activities. This is why I urge as many students to be involved in them as possible.

As it is every year, one of my main purposes in writing to the community is to thank them for their unstinting efforts in making the school the great place it is.

To the Education Support staff, your work is intrinsic to the effective and successful functioning of the school. From assisting students with additional needs, mending locks, mixing chemicals and paying the bills, to arranging music or library shelves, your work is invaluable. Thank you.

To our wonderful teaching team, your passion, care and dedication to your students is remarkable. There is no question that running schools in general, and teaching specifically, is, as I observed above, one of the most complex and challenging undertakings. Thank you.

To the Principal Team, Lee Angelidis, Kaye Sentry and Leisa Higgins, and the rest of the Leadership Team, Jessica de Neef, Rebecca McMahon, Travis Dangstorp, Mark Doyle, Effie Frangoulis, Nathan Hutchins, and Melissa Antoniuk, your work, commitment to the school, guidance, and support have been outstanding. On behalf of the school community, thank-you.

I want to thank our parents/guardians for their support. Once again, you have been by our side in this all the way. You have supported the school in our efforts and recognised that none of us could do this alone.

The College Council, led by Asaf Harel, has been steadfast in its support of the school during this challenging year, and has been diligent in discharging its important governance and strategic planning roles. Thank you.

My thanks to the College Captains, Georgie Price and Arjun Thakur. They have worked very hard to make the College a better place. Their work developing the House badges, and the Teach the Teacher program, in particular, has been outstanding.


To the students, I wish you a well-earned break. It has been a challenging year for everyone, but no more so than for you. I wish you a safe and enjoyable summer holiday.

It's been my pleasure to have served two years as the Brighton Secondary College President.  Our international student program which has successfully run at our college for over 22 years, is slowly starting to rebuild as we start welcoming international students back into our college community with the re-opening of borders. The diversity of our student population is something we value and celebrate.

We later followed up with a longer session looking at interpreting and implementing feedback which took place on a staff PL day. To have this opportunity to present the students' feelings and ideas to the staff was a crucial step in improving the relationships between staff and students in the classroom to become more open and honest.

This year, we also built on the work of previous student leaders to better implement our new house names into the school community. We did this by choosing house logos that accurately reflected the values of the prominent Australians chosen to represent our houses that also aligned with our school values. From here, we created house badges that have now become central to our school community. 












# SCIENCE

After the bumpy last few years, our Science team was looking forward to seeing our students back in our labs instead of on the screen. This year included a new set of challenges with the permanent return to on site learning but also gave us an opportunity to reintegrate experiments back into the Science curriculum, both the old favourites and some exciting new ones! Once again, our Science teachers continued to deliver a rich curriculum and our students stayed focused and engaged.

In Year 7 we started the year by getting to know safety in the lab, science equipment, and how to light a Bunsen burner, always a favourite! Later in the year we investigated separation techniques and how they can be used around the world to obtain clean water.

Year 8 students studied the different types of energy and how it could be stored and converted into Creepy crawly movement. From there we moved onto Biology and the most anticipated experiment of the year – Heart Dissections

"The Creepy Crawly experiment is a way of testing the elastic potential energy in a rubber band and how it is converted into kinetic energy. #Fun #YOLO #Science #Kinetic" - Finn Hunter

Our Year 9 students have been investigating microplastics, their presence and impact on the ecosystems. They have also studied the nervous system, concluding with a brain dissection.

The Year 10's have studied inheritance, natural selection and evolution. In their Kinematics unit students investigated Newton's laws by building mini-crash test dummies, attaching them to small trolley's and speeding them down the ramp and into the wall... there were actually more survivors than expected.

2022 saw the welcome return of Science Week with many activities and ongoing competitions throughout the week including pasta towers, cake decorating, setting students (safely) on fire and concluding with science trivia.



# MATHEMATICS

What a year it has been in Mathematics for Brighton Secondary College!

Well done to all students, teachers, parents, and carers for working hard this year and developing students' understanding of mathematics and reasoning!

Year 7-9 students completed a structured work program to develop mathematical fluency, problem solving, reasoning, and critical thinking. Students completed these programs to a high level and showed strong determination and growth. Some examples of student activities throughout the year included:

Year 7: Students critically analysed their snacking habits. They looked at the snacks that they consume and that are available at school. They then performed a survey amongst their fellow students to gather data on healthy snack possibilities. Finally, they put together a statistical analysis on the data collected and communicated their findings.

Year 8: This year students demonstrated their understanding of probability by going on an adventure! They teamed up with a partner and calculated a variety of probability scenarios to complete a race in challenging the frightful boss 'The Lych-Wells'. They then demonstrated their calculations using a variety of probability models to justify their decisions.

Year 9: Students started the year covering financial mathematics. They took an in-depth look at how finances are managed including how simple and compound interest effects both loans and investments. Students specifically evaluated common scenarios such as the value of different loans for purchasing a vehicle, and how to save money on different salary bases.

Year 10: Students began the year with a very challenging look at Algebra before moving on to trigonometry to explore how we use measurement in everyday scenarios. Students also revisited the topic of financial mathematics and how to apply these skills both today and in their future lives.


Our VCE students completed a very challenging year in some very difficult mathematics courses!

Students developed their understanding of a variety of mathematical concepts and worked hard to develop their skills in creating mathematical models and evaluating those models. In year 12 students analysed data to understand the relationship between life expectancy and birth rate, modelled realistic situations related to loans and investments, evaluated the focal point of different shaped lenses, explored space and planet colonization, and, of course, evaluated the effectiveness of Mr. Chan's golf game! In year 11, students modelled ocean tides, flights of aircraft, and interpreted the design of roller coasters.



In 2022, the Brighton Secondary College offered two Outdoor Education based subjects. Year 10 Outdoor Education and Year 12 Outdoor and Environmental Studies. Both subjects have a strong curriculum-based focus to the VCE study design for Units 1 to 4

During the school year, students made direct links from topics and areas of study to outdoor environments they visited and studied. Multiple opportunities were given to find links to their respective outdoor environments. Students participated in a variety of practical experiences that included camps, excursions and area evaluations.

Year 10 Outdoor Education was lucky enough to have two separate classes attend two camps over the course of the year. In Semester 1, the camp focussed on Motivations for seeking Outdoor Experiences as students visited Walhalla and the Thompson River respectively. Students spent 4 nights camping at Cooper's Creek and undertook activities such as rafting, camp cooking and hiking.

In Semester 2, the Year 10 students camp was focussed on Risk Management and Technology in the Outdoors. Students attended a 4-night camp at Rubicon Outdoor School, Nayook Campus and undertook activities such as caving, mountain bike riding, abseiling, rock climbing, wood carving and camp craft.

Across the year, students of Year 12 Outdoor and Environmental Studies studied several areas of study to meet and achieve individual outcomes. They completed two camps, one to the Otways and surrounding area in March and one at the Mt Baw Baw Alpine Village in July. Students focussed on historical and contemporary relationships with outdoor environments and healthy, sustainable outdoor environments respectively.

With restrictions eased and camps back on, 2022 has been a very successful year for all involved. With lots of fun along the way and stories to share and tell, the students have demonstrated significant growth and involved themselves in lifelong learning.

We cannot wait for 2023!

# FRENCH

Alot has been happening in French this year across the various classes and year levels. Year 7 to 12 students went on their own discoveries of French.

Junior students learned that speaking French can come in handy when traveling the world: with 300 million French speakers across seven continents, it is likely that their French speaking skills will help them communicate with locals or travellers in the future. Through French, students also collaborated, played together and realised that teamwork can support success for all.

French learners immersed themselves in the culture and had regular debates about what it is to be French, Australian, what stereotypes are and how to understand another language through its traditions and practices. As the French language school ambassador, the Alliance Française de Melbourne, humorously put it:

Among numerous activities, Year 7 students created characters for a story book, became actors and had conversations in French

Year 8 French students worked on creating a travel itinerary, planning their trip to a French-speaking destination. They had been given a budget of 5000 euros (around 7,200 AUD) and had to book their return flights, accommodation, and write directions to at least 5 key locations in the city. Afterwards, students wrote a travel journal entry reflecting on their trip in French.

In Year 9 French, the students worked on writing a Michelin Guide review. Students went to a French restaurant or café of their choosing, or cook a French meal, in their own time and then reviewed the meal they ate or cooked all in French!

In the Year 10 French class, the students worked on their knowledge of the French speaking world writing a biography in French about a famous French-speaking person of their choice, including famous philosophers, architects, fashion designers, writers, and more. There were many interesting people to read about!

Year 9 and 10 students also prepared to transition to the senior VCE and IB years and started discussing complex issues in French

VCE and IBDP students explored personal and world-wide issues related to the French speaking communities. They experienced the world of work in the French community, spending a day in a bilingual French childcare centre. For a day, they became French carers in charge of supervising young children and teaching them French.

The small but highly engaged class powered through with several students reaching bilingual level. Importantly, the students developed their open-mindedness and critical thinking skills, which are crucial attributes in the global world.

All in all, it was a fantastic year in French!







# JAPANESE

Students in Japanese experienced a range of fun and exciting learning opportunities this year. Students in year 7 produced their own business cards and learnt about the importance of relationships within business. Year 8s also learnt a lot about the delicious and famous cuisine of Japan and performed a role play in Japanese centred around it.

Year 9s had fun creating a promotional school video to show prospective international parents to invite them to come to our school. They were able to use their developing language skills and technology to produce excellent quality videos. 
