

HOUSE THEME DAYS


The junior and senior student leadership teams of each house collaborated to run a theme day in every term to help raise money for local, important charities and to help connect the BSC community with our wider community.

VICTORIAN YOUNG LEADERS TO INDIA

This year our college was fortunate to be accepted into the Victorian Young Leaders to India Program.

The Virtual VYL India Program will:

- foster connections and develop relationships with communities and schools of India and with the Indian diaspora in Victoria.
- develop students' engagement and future opportunities in STEM by completing an inquiry-led project and design challenge which addresses a real-world issue related to the UN Sustainable Development Goals.
- build intercultural capability by completing the Global Competence Certificate (GCC), an online 10 module program with live online reflective sessions, and through guided interactions to build understanding culture, life and school in Australia and India.
- develop students' global citizenship and leadership capabilities.

On Tuesday 21st February four of our Year 9 STEM Students participating in this program attended an in person workshop with students from other Victorian schools. They interacted with peers and took part in team building activities as they explored intercultural understanding and what it means to be a global citizen.


At the very end of the day they had an opportunity to briefly meet with their school buddies from India with whom they'll be working on a Design Challenge related to the Sustainable Development Goals.




ANTONIO CAMARGO SILVA - INTERNATIONAL HANDBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

SARAH - JUMP ROPE SILVER MEDALIST

On the 8th of July, I travelled from Melbourne to Colorado Springs in the US with 102 Australian athletes to compete in the 2023 World Jump Rope Championships (IJRU) @ijru_jumprope. We were all part of Skipping Australia.

There were a total of 1500 athletes at the championships from 27 countries such as Belgium, France, Denmark, Czech Republic, Guatemala, Hungary, Japan, Puerto Rico, China, amongst others. It was overwhelming to see and meet so many athletes, to have fun with them and to compete against them.

My jump rope journey (skipping) started when I was in grade 2. It was an after school recreational activity, where we were all learning how to jump and do various tricks, such as cross over, speed relay, double Dutch and triple under. You spend 2 years learning how to turn your rope and jump, how to jump in pairs and be synchronised. At the end of each year, you will be part of a concert showing to your audience what you have learned over the year.

In grade 5, you are now involved in State (Victoria only) and National (all Australia States) competitions. If you won a gold, silver or bronze medal, in one of your disciplines you will be selected to attend World Jump Rope competition which is held in a different country every year.

I was selected to go to the world championship in 2022, after winning a silver medal at the national competition for Double Dutch Speed, which was held in Darwin

It was such a privilege to partake in the world championship competition in Colorado Springs this year. I enjoyed all the hours of training on site, observing other athletes from other countries, but also learning from them, being open minded, and working hard on being consistent with my routines while under the pressure of the competition.

This experience shows that working hard, training for 3 hours, 3 times a week and rehearsing your routine and tricks at home during your free time is the key to success. As we said: 'Practice makes perfect'.

Thanks to my parents, friends and coaches who always encouraged me and pushed me when I felt down. They helped me to reach my goal and set myself up for success to win a silver medal.

Bodie competed in the following events, Alpine (giant slalom) and finished 51st from 203 competitors, Ski cross and finished 17th out of 204 competitors in the qualifying run, and 24th of 32 competitors in the final, and Moguls finished 28th of 77 competitors.

These are excellent results, and he now qualifies for a select ski program at Mt Buller next year.

WELLBEING TEAM

It has been another busy and significant year for the wellbeing team as we have transitioned into a refurbished facility in the "West Wing" of the school, whilst maintaining our support of individual students and delivering student programs. The team includes myself (Wellbeing Manager/Psychologist), Jess (Student Welfare Coordinator), Kylie (Mental Health Practitioner/Psychologist) and Tania (Chaplain). Each of us is involved in counselling students when they are facing particular challenges, providing the support they need for optimal learning.

We have also been actively involved in a variety of school camps and programs, creating opportunities to build supportive connections with students and provide mental health education. The wellbeing team has continued to train and work with our Peer Support leaders as they mentor our new Year 7s at the start of each year. We spent a morning with each Year 7 class in the new wellbeing centre, delivering the START (School Transition & Resilience Training) program. Aside from its content, this program serves to familiarise students with the wellbeing team and our facilities.

We have worked very closely with an external provider, Toolbox Education, to deliver wellbeing education programs for Year 8 ("Mental Movies"), 9 ("Thinking Traps") & 10 ("Assertive Communication") students. The wellbeing team also developed a partnership with the Hampton and Brighton Rotary Clubs to fund and deliver Teen Mental Health First Aid training to all Year 9 students.

Wellbeing is also well-represented in student leadership, with our team of senior and junior wellbeing leaders working together to deliver a mental health project. This year's project was a newsletter called Brain Works. The three editions of Brain Works focused on accessing mental health support, reducing stigma and managing stress and anxiety. I appreciate the work of our wellbeing leaders to make this project a reality.

Finally, I want to thank the many students, families and staff I have worked with over my 25 years at Brighton Secondary College. It has been a tremendous privilege to have been part of this school community for such a significant part of my life. As I move beyond BSC, I will continue to carry very fond memories of my time here.

MATHEMATICS

An excellent year of Mathematics for Brighton Secondary College!

Well done to all students, teachers, parents, and carers for making this year memorable, and for supporting the learning and development of all our students!

Year 7-9 students completed a structured work program to develop mathematical fluency, problem solving, reasoning, and critical thinking. Students completed these programs to a high level and showed strong determination and growth. Some examples of student activities throughout the year include:

Year 7: Students developed their understanding of statistics by completing a statistical analysis on their own personally designed research questions. They conducted surveys, collected data, analysed the data, and even looked at graphing and analysing 2nd hand data on historical results of AFL teams.

Year 8: This year students demonstrated their understanding of probability by going on an adventure! They teamed up with a partner and calculated a variety of probability scenarios to compete a race in challenging the frightful boss 'The Lych-Wells'. They then demonstrated their calculations using a variety of probability models to justify their decisions.

Year 9: Students started the year covering financial mathematics. They took an in-depth look at how finances are managed including how simple and compound interest effects both loans and investments. Students evaluated common scenarios such as the value of different loans and investments.

Year IO: Students began the year with a very challenging look at Algebra before moving on to trigonometry to explore how we use measurement in everyday scenarios. Students also revisited the topic of financial mathematics and how to apply these skills both today and in their future lives.

Our VCE students completed a very challenging year in some very difficult mathematics courses!

Students developed their understanding of a variety of mathematical concepts and worked hard to develop their skills in creating mathematical models and evaluating those models. In VCE General students analysed data to understand the relationship between happiness and other variables, modelled realistic situations related to loans and investments. In VCE Methods, students took a journey through the early life of Mr. Naef by evaluating a variety of scenarios and problems of the adventures of his favourite pet pig. Students also investigated the probability and created statistical models of early parenthood scenarios. In VCE Specialist Maths, students investigated and explored the fundamentals of both the Taylor Series and the Maclaurin Series. In VCE Foundation maths students investigated scale factor by designing a suitable enclosure based on the dimensions of individual animals.

HUMANITES

Humanities have continued to explore the ever-changing world around us - it's never a dull moment in our classrooms!

Year 7 began with geography, they collected their own data, heading out on a walkability audit of Brighton East. Everyone did a phenomenal job investigating their surroundings through a geographical lens. As the year progressed they honed their humanities research skills by exploring a chosen ancient civilisation in history. One highlight was exploring real life artefacts such as an altimeter from a WWII combat plane and a walk-man from the 1990s!

Five Year 7 students had the chance to participate in the Emerging Leaders Forum sponsored by the University of Melbourne. They connected with students from Australia, China, and Indonesia over



3 days to foster global citizenship, develop leadership skills and contribute to the BSC community.

At Year 8, students investigated a direct-action movement in Australia, creating videos to call their audience to action and explain what they should do to affect change. They then compared Medieval worlds, using sources to investigate how the European and Mongol




civilisations established and expanded their power.

Year 9 offered students the opportunity to broaden their perspectives. In Civics, they became active participants in democracy, researching and creating and action project on an issue of their choice. Students reached out to local politicians, organised petitions, and created videos to raise awareness. Meanwhile, SEALP students used each of their subjects to explore the relationship between the individual, government and society. Their year culminated in Geography, exploring climate change as both an environmental process and a factor that influences the wellbeing of citizens.

Year 10 students evaluated the causes for WWII and learned about both the European and Pacific theatres of war. They continued on to explore how macroeconomic structures shape everyday experiences by exploring the cost of living crisis. One highlight was the year 10 Fieldwork experience at Hampton beach where students investigated the natural and man-made features of this local coastal area and learned about the ways human activities can damage this important coastal environment.

In Year II History students chose terrorism and the US invasion of Afghanistan as their final unit topic. To enhance their understanding of sensitive content, students were privileged to hear from Zuleyha Keskin from the Islamic Sciences and Research Academy of Australia who spoke about core beliefs of the religion and women's experiences of Islam, as well as differentiating religious extremism.

Year II Business Management students headed to Southland Shopping Centre to explore a range of authentic marketing strategies through different stores. This provided students with the opportunity to explore a range of retailers and apply their business management knowledge to practical business situations.



LANGUAGES

It was another eventful year for Language students, with many exciting learning opportunities provided in and out of the classroom.

In Year 7, both French and Japanese students started with the basics of the languages: how to greet and exchange personal information in the target language. While in French we also explored the geography of French-speaking countries and their cuisine, Japanese students learnt how to read and write hiragana, one of the three types of 'alphabets'. Regardless, by the end of the year, all our students were able to not only introduce themselves, but also describe their family members and pets.

In Year 8, students explored a range of topics in French or Japanese, and they expanded on their ability to express themselves when speaking and writing. Focusing on leisure activities, French students attended French Film Festival and related to the film's characters, and Japanese students immersed themselves in hobbies and sports traditional to Japan.

In Year 9, more complex grammatical patterns were introduced, such as French passé compose and Japanese conjugations of U adjectives. Japanese students explored house, public school system and weather, creating written and spoken responses to set tasks. They participated in a hands-on taiko drumming experience, together with select winners of competitions organised in other year-levels. French students discovered fashion, weather and café life-style. During a couple of excursions, they explored the Paris end of the city, and had crepes for lunch.

Senior Japanese students had an amazing opportunity to join the Japan Tour this year, the first since the pandemic. It was a fantastic experience and helped further strengthen the bond with our sister school in Tokoname.

Year 10 students continued building a rich vocabulary and complex grammar patterns. In French, they toured Melbourne, presented bibliographies of famous people, and explored workplaces. Similarly in Japanese, they learnt how to describe people, navigate places and how to respond to job ads, amongst other.

Our VCE students worked hard to become confident users of Languages. It was challenging at times, no doubt, with regular studies required, but rewarding with authentic possibilities in connecting with people outside our borders, as their cross-cultural understanding and appreciation deepened. 

The students used the Hall space and Drama room to create a makeshift photography studio where they were able to experiment with photography and lighting techniques.


