"DON'T THROW THE BABY OUT WITH THE BATH-WATER"

Change has almost become the norm for our society over recent years. Economic conditions have changed. Democratic patterns have changed. Political emphases have changed. And our education system has changed, and will continue to change.

Over the last year the major change in education, affecting schools, has been the creation of a Ministry of Education to replace what was the This has Education Department. involved a re-structure and development of a Corporate Management approach to administration. Further elements of the restructure will become evident during next year.

The changes in our education system are in part a response to changes in society and to changes in economic conditions. The aim is for education to provide better for altered circumstances, and to promote equity and social justice. One of the major educational changes will be the introduction of the Victorian Certificate of Education to replace the Higher School Certificate. This combined Year II and 12 course, to be introduced in 1989, will provide a wider range of courses to cater for a greater proportion of students to study at the senior levels in schools. Traditionalists may see this as a watering down of curriculum and lowering of standards.

I don't believe this. Our challenge is to continue the pursuit of excellence. I believe that pursuit of excellence can continue within the changed requirements for the Victorian Certificate Education. And this is an aim we must follow - we must ensure that we "don't throw out the baby with the bath-water."

We need to examine our achievements and successes and decide what parts of our tradition we need to preserve and retain in our school program.

I believe we need to continue our pursuit of academic excellence. believe too that we need to retain our extra-curricular program - House Drama Competition, House Choral Competition, Annual School Musical Production, sporting participation, along with many other fine school traditions.

In spite of recent changes in education, and an indication of further changes to come, we can face the future with confidence. school has shown it is capable of adapting to changed circumstances. One of its strongest points has been the retention of a rich tradition of success, and the absorption of the newest and best into its programs for instance computing and processing. As we continue our growth we should approach the future with confidence and certainty of success.


As I went round the river bend, the current thrashed me into the thorny hands of prickle bushes, and there I lay trapped, grasping the bushes for dear life.

On Tuesday 6th May, Brighton High's annual choral festival was held, and for all concerned it was both an exciting and nerve-wracking experience.


