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FROM THE PRINCIPAL - JOHN N. FOWLER.

"DON'T THROW THE BABY OUT WITH THE BATH-WATER"

Change has almost become the norm for our society over recent years. Economic conditions have changed. Democratic patterns have changed. Political emphases have changed. And our education system has changed, and will continue to change.

Over the last year the major change in education, affecting schools, has been the creation of a Ministry of Education to replace what was the Education Department. This has involved a re-structure and the development of a Corporate Management approach to administration. Further elements of the restructure will become evident during next year.

The changes in our education system are in part a response to changes in society and to changes in economic conditions. The aim is for education to provide better for altered circumstances, and to promote equity and social justice. One of the major educational changes will be the introduction of the Victorian Certificate of Education to replace the Higher School Certificate. This combined Year 11 and 12 course, to be introduced in 1989, will provide a wider range of courses to cater for a greater proportion of students to study at the senior levels in schools. Traditionalists may see this as a watering down of curriculum and lowering of standards.

I don't believe this. Our challenge is to continue the pursuit of excellence. I believe that the pursuit of excellence can continue within the changed requirements for the Victorian Certificate of Education. And this is an aim we must follow - we must ensure that we "don't throw out the baby with the bath-water."

We need to examine our past achievements and successes and decide what parts of our tradition we need to preserve and retain in our school program.

I believe we need to continue our pursuit of academic excellence. I believe too that we need to retain our extra-curricular program - House Drama Competition, House Choral Competition, Annual School Musical Production, sporting participation, along with many other fine school traditions.

In spite of recent changes in education, and an indication of further changes to come, we can face the future with confidence. Our school has shown it is capable of adapting to changed circumstances. One of its strongest points has been the retention of a rich tradition of success, and the absorption of the newest and best into its programs - for instance computing and word processing. As we continue our growth we should approach the future with confidence and certainty of success.

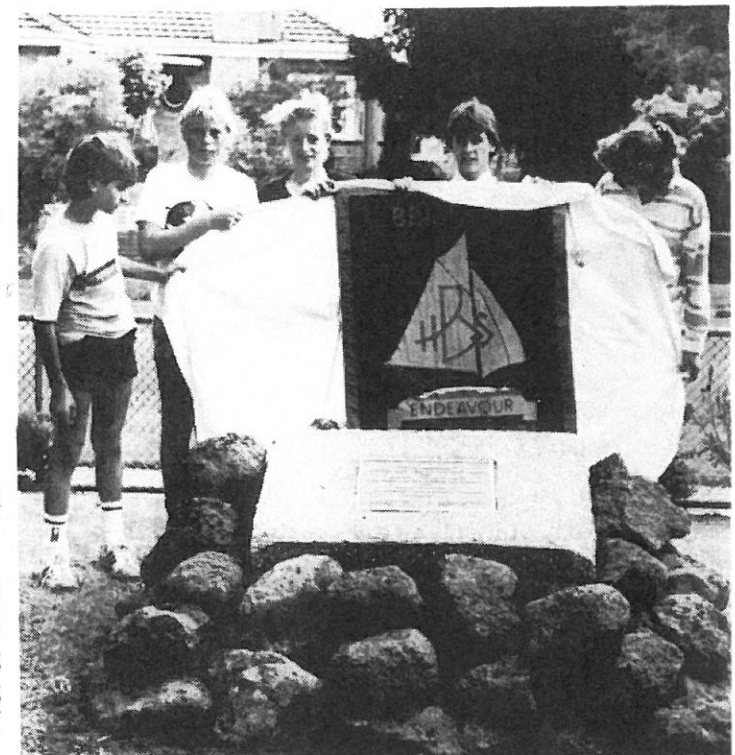
The year has been an active one with weekly meetings and one night meeting to catch up on outstanding business. There have been wide-ranging discussions covering all aspects of school life.

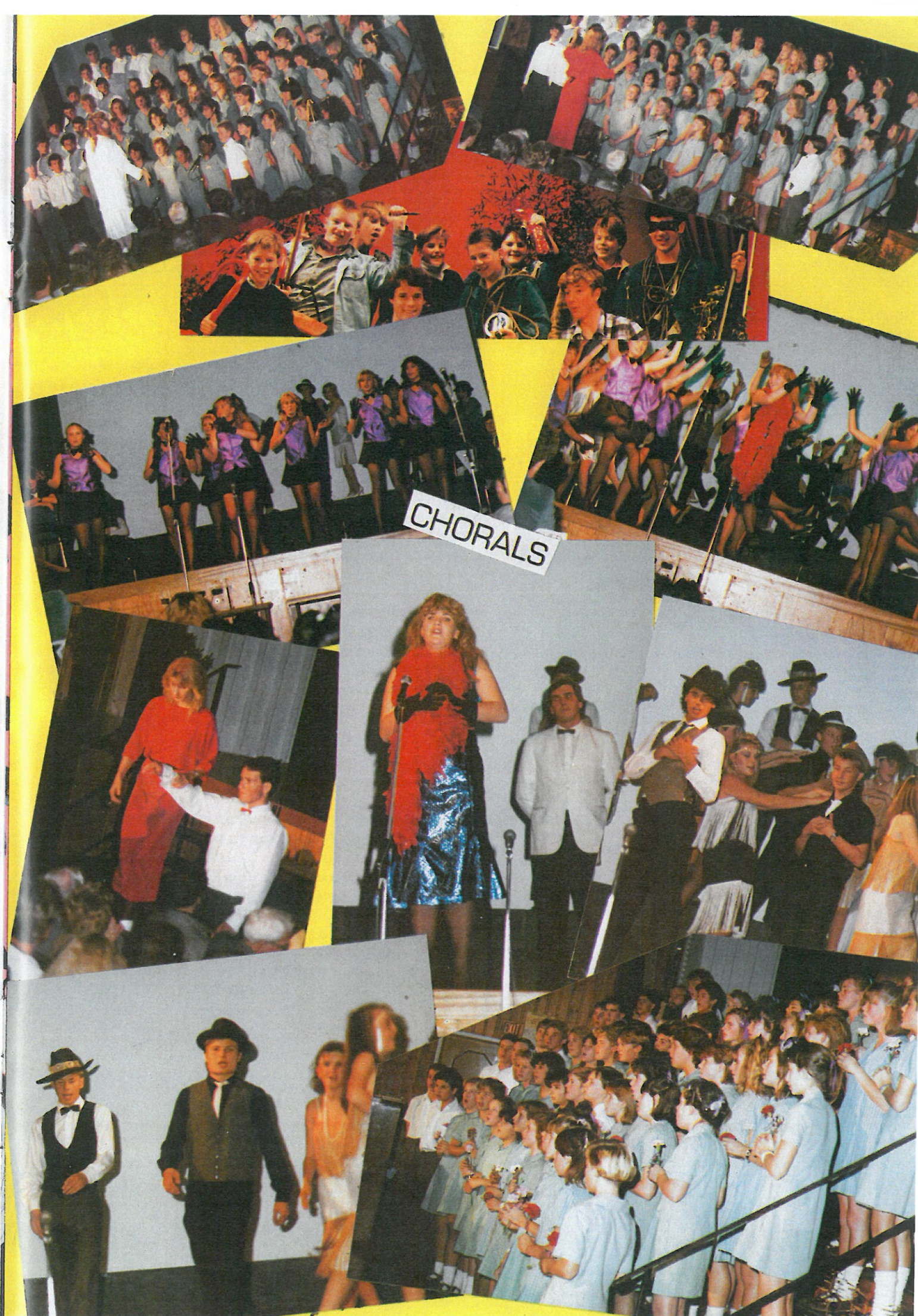
LONSDALE CHORALS.

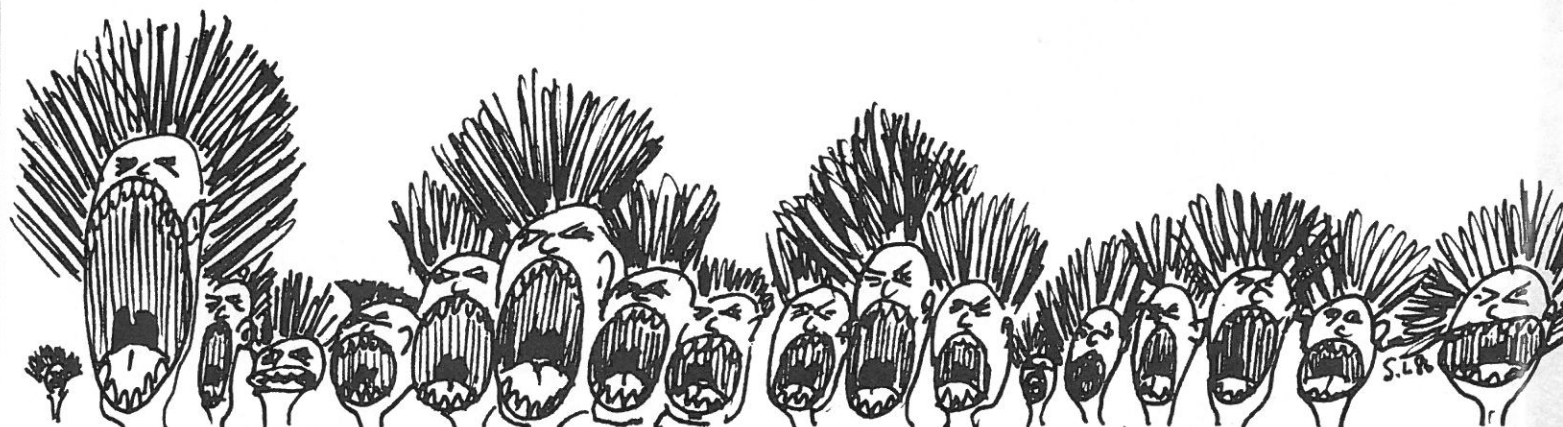

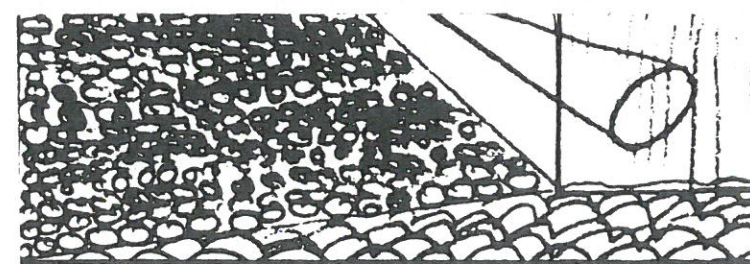

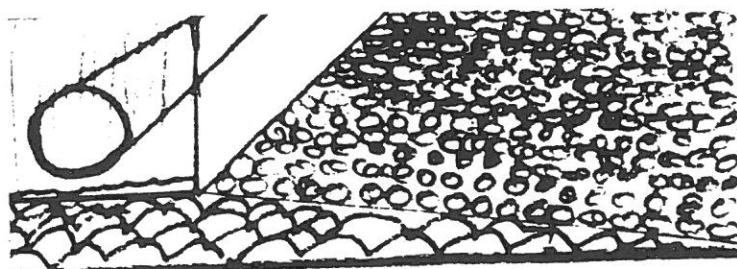

The set was an elaborate construction consisting of scrap wood and cheap calico. The final result was a big, grey, crooked wall with bricks veering off at acute angles. But in true "she'll be right" fashion, Mr Gould rationalized stating that it gave the wall that "old castle" look.

Meanwhile, Grant was fast becoming the Australia II of the drama festival with no-one really knowing how good or bad we really were. An intensive propaganda campaign was commenced with hundreds of leaflets with jelly beans on them (the jelly beans were relevant to the play) being distributed on the night of the festival and hundreds more leaflets adorning the hall foyer. This sent the other houses into a frenzy resulting in pathetic imitations and defacing of the leaflets.

The fact that we were to perform last only compounded the problem as the applause and laughter for other houses coupled with arrogant comments from some of the performers only served to increase tension. However, our turn came around and apart from a couple of minor flaws, the cast performed impeccably resulting in the play reaching its peak.

The adjudicator must have also been impressed as he awarded Grant the Best Actor Award to Brett Parry, Best Actress Award to Alison Bell, and finally the Best Play Award.



Grant had won the 1986 Drama Festival, much to the amazement of many sceptics and knockers. Finally Grant's cultural stigma had been removed and once again "Granties" could walk the North Corridor with dignity.

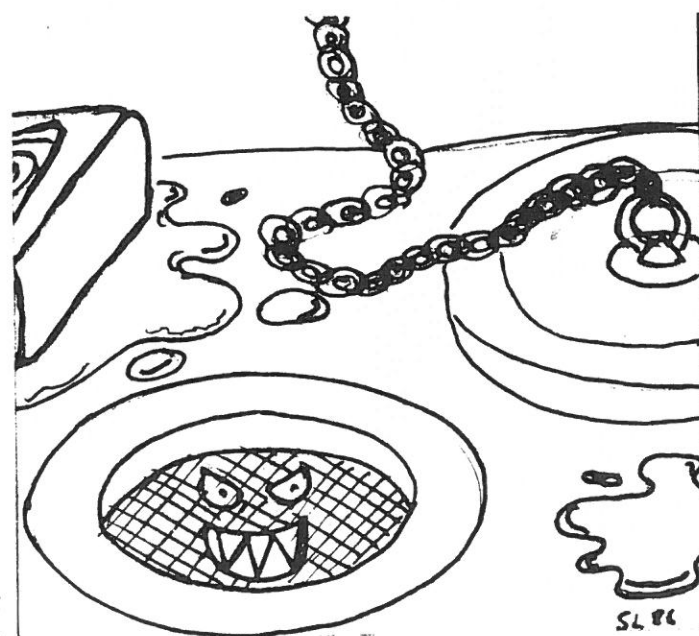

My rebuttals however, were a disaster. I was so intent on finishing my speech, that I completely forgot my half page of rebuttals and, as a result, lost marks for the team.

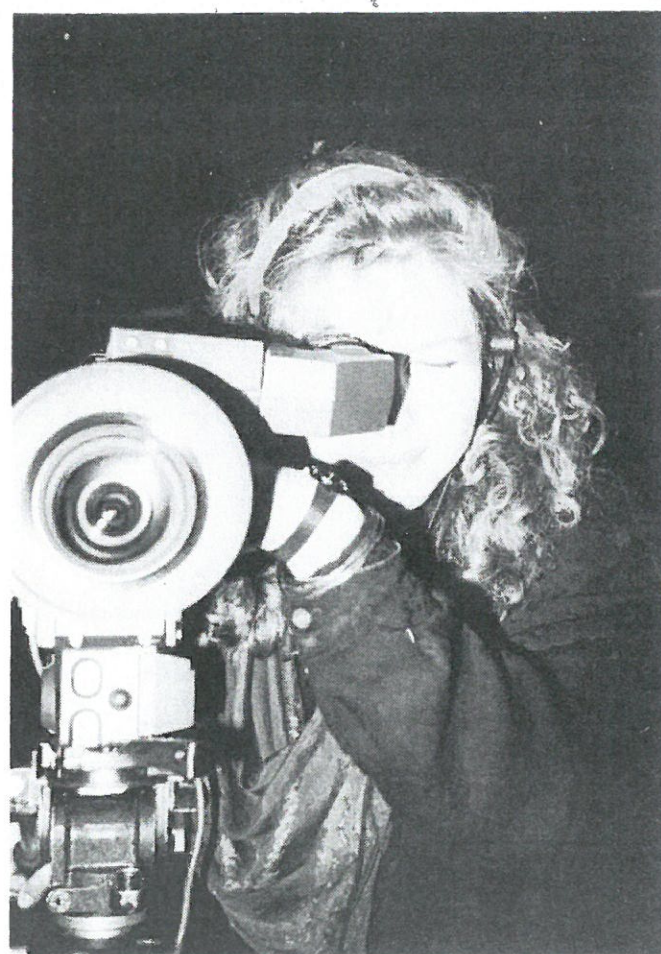
Katrina, as third speaker, summed up our case and thoroughly crushed the opposition's case with her explosive rebuttals.

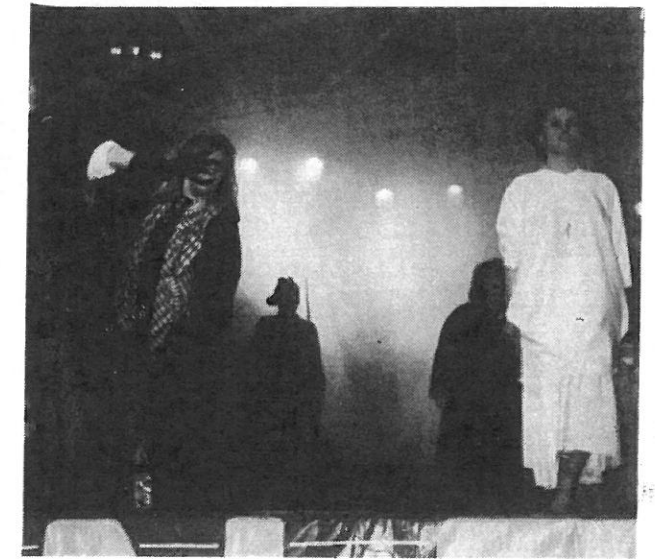


A weary bus load returned to school at 5.30 p.m., proud of what they had achieved and learning lots from the experience.

I had a great day with a group of students I congratulate and thank.

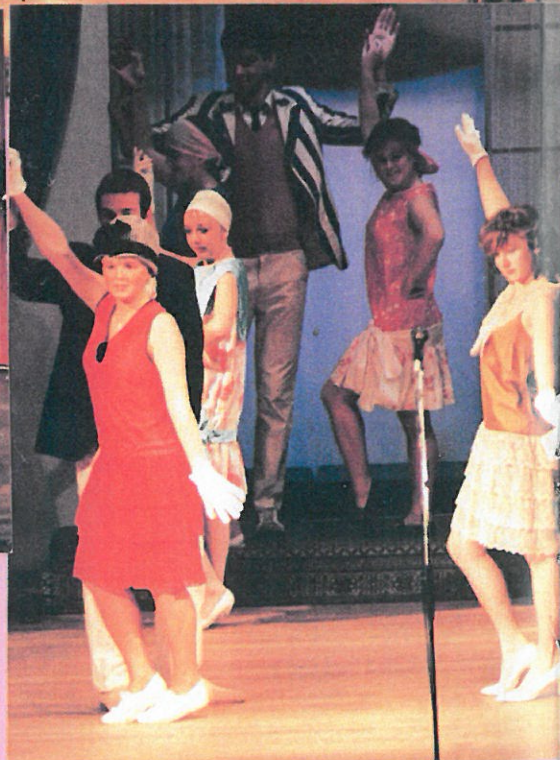
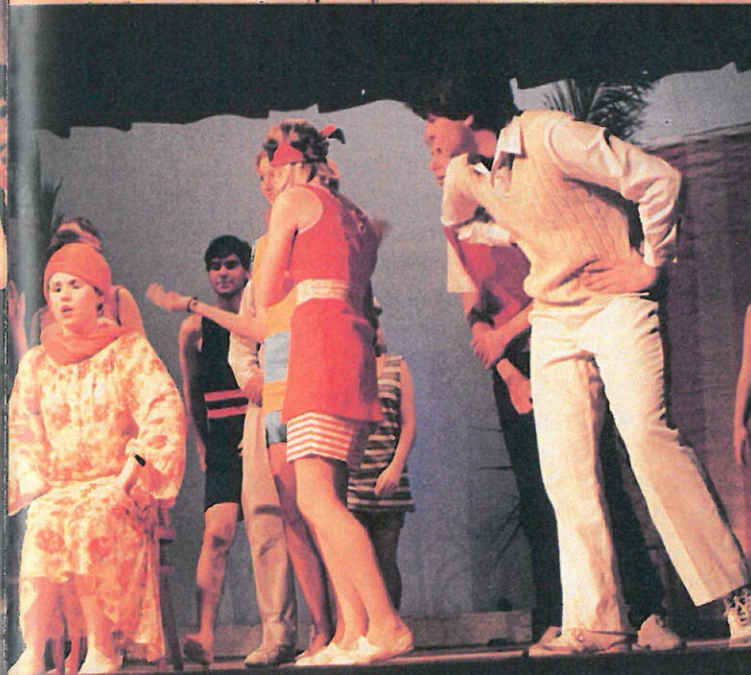

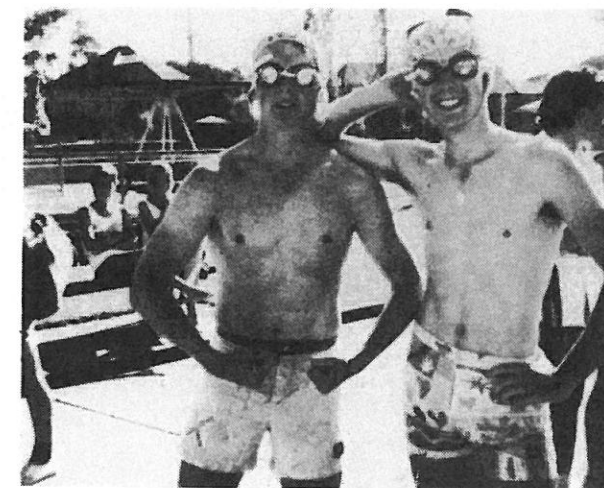
Brighton High Football team had a full and successful season. We competed in the Herald Shield, Prahran Centenary Competition and the regular school competition.
